

Youth

"The best way for the kids to be involved in the culture is for the parents to be involved in the culture."

One youth offered:

"Teach them their dances, their languages, to speak their language, to teach their language, and read their language, and to write their language and to make the foods that are traditional and not unhealthy, and just be able to eat something that's healthy every day, and just let them be aware of what they're eating. Because it plays a big role in spirituality and mentality..."

"There's a sacred process to what we do.
That's part of that process and not just an
arts and crafts project."

"The reality is that these programs need to be like our families are, which is whole based. The whole family – we can't just skip a generation by reaching to the children. We need to be giving a hand in culture activities for the whole family."


"In order to get the kids really interested, they have to see their parents invested in it as well."








Our Strong Fathers



Through group and individualized support, OSF is designed to meet Urban American Indian / Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian / Pacific Islander father's cultural and parenting needs. OSF will work to reduce the personal, cultural and systemic barriers that disproportionately affect Native Fathers and strengthen the bond between Native Fathers and their children, partners, and community.

-Addiction



Men & Teen Boys account for 70% of the national suicide rate. As Natives, we are 3x more likely to die of suicide than non-Natives. We need to learn how to talk openly about our mental health if we hope to break the cycles & change the outcomes.

Full Spectrum Doula Care

We provide free-of-cost services to American Indian, Alaskan Native. Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander families birthing in King County. We work with families prenatally through 3-months postpartum to improve birth outcomes and reduce personal, cultural, and systemic barriers that disproportionately affect Indigenous parents. Our program aims to strengthen the bond between parents and connections to the community.

We were never meant to do this alone.
