

### Families Served Through Evidence-Based Home Visiting in 2020

Models implemented in Iowa included Early Head Start Home-Based Option, Family Connects, Healthy Families America, Nurse-Family Partnership, and Parents as Teachers. Statewide, 59 local agencies operated at least one of these models.

#### Potential Beneficiaries in 2020

In lowa, there were 177,000 pregnant women and families with children under 6 years old not yet in kindergarten who could benefit from home visiting. These families included 230,600 children.
