## Families Served Through Evidence-Based Home Visiting in 2020

Models implemented in Kentucky included Early Head Start Home-Based Option, Health Access Nurturing Development Services, Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters, and Parents as Teachers. Statewide, 71 local agencies operated at least one of these models.

In Kentucky, there were 255,100 pregnant women and families with children under 6 years old not yet in kindergarten who could benefit from home visiting. These families included 319,800 children.

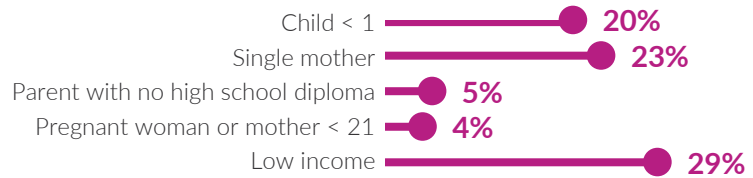

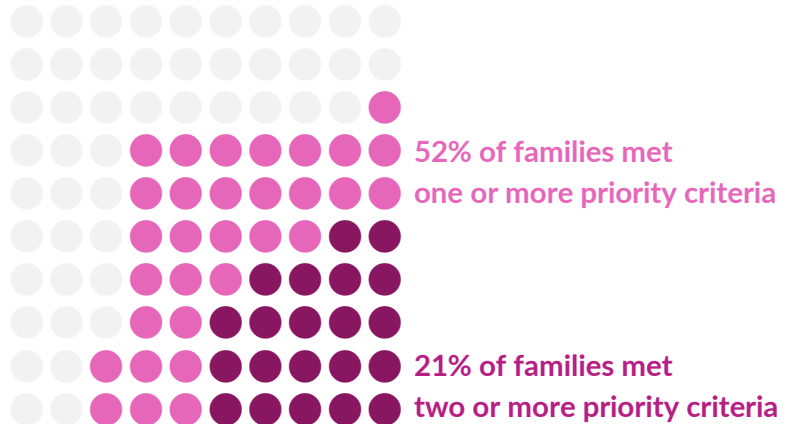
