Models implemented in Maine included Attachment and Biobehavioral Catch-Up, Early Head Start Home-Based Option, and Parents as Teachers. Statewide, 20 local agencies operated at least one of these models.

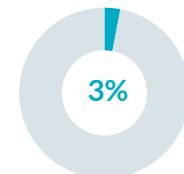

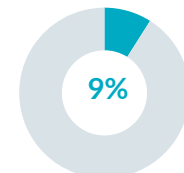

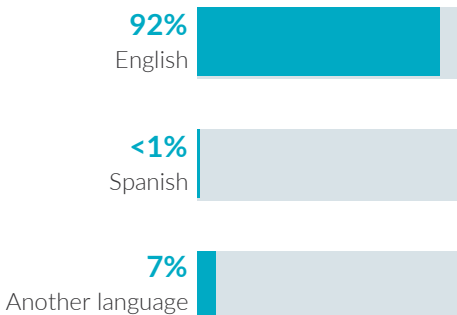

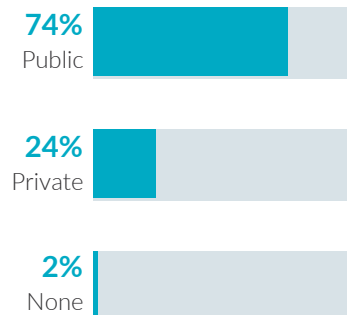

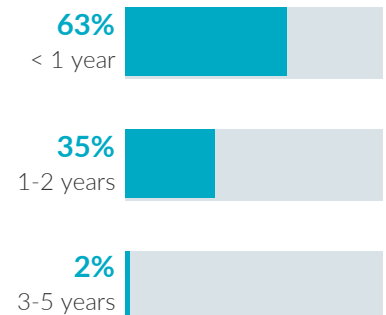

In Maine, there were 61,800 pregnant women and families with children under 6 years old not yet in kindergarten who could benefit from home visiting. These families included 75,600 children.

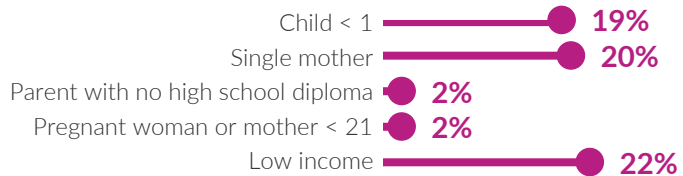

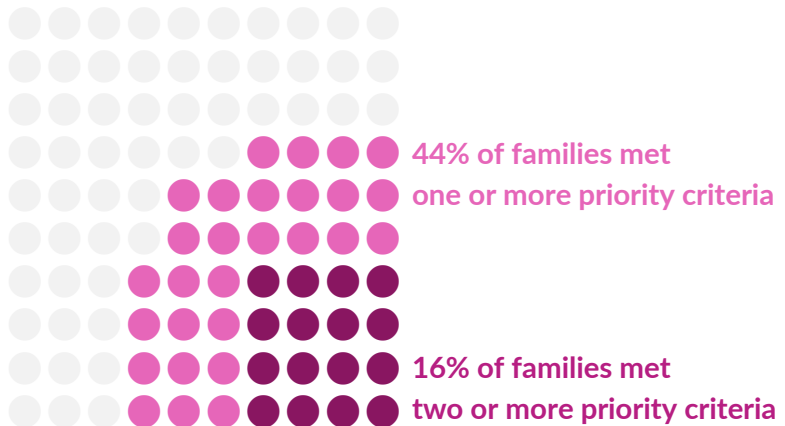
