

Families Served Through Evidence-Based Home Visiting in 2020

Models implemented in New Jersey included Early Head Start Home-Based Option, Healthy Families America, Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters, Nurse-Family Partnership, and Parents as Teachers. Statewide, 56 local agencies operated at least one of these models.

In New Jersey, there were 460,600 pregnant women and families with children under 6 years old not yet in kindergarten who could benefit from home visiting. These families included 602,300 children.

The number of children served in 2019 was included as a proxy for children and families served in 2020. • HFA reported primary language of caregivers. • HIPPY did not report virtual home visits. • NFP reported primary language of caregivers. • PAT data for child insurance status and primary language were not included.

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
