

## Early Head Start Home-Based Option

Early Head Start Home-Based Option (EHS) provides individualized services to pregnant women, infants, and toddlers to promote the school readiness of young children from families with low incomes. The model is administered by the Office of Head Start in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Administration for Children and Families. EHS promotes the school readiness of children from birth to 3 years old by enhancing their cognitive, social, and emotional development.

Who is implementing the model?	<ul> <li>Home Visitors</li> <li>EHS was implemented by 5,646 home visitors in 2022. The model requires a home-based Child Development Associate credential, comparable credential, or equivalent coursework as part of an associate's or bachelor's degree. Home visitors are required to maintain an average caseload of 10 to 12 families.</li> <li>Supervisors</li> <li>The model requires a bachelor's or other advanced degree with coursework in early childhood education and early education experience for supervisors.</li> </ul>	
Where is the model implemented?		EHS operated in 855 local agencies across 49 states and the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands in 2022.


