

Arizona

Families Served Through Evidence-Based Home Visiting in 2023

Models implemented in Arizona included Early Head Start Home-Based Option, Family Check-Up, Family Spirit, Healthy Families America, Maternal Early Childhood Sustained Home-Visiting, Nurse-Family Partnership, Parents as Teachers, and SafeCare Augmented. Statewide, 88 local agencies operated at least one of these models.

Potential Beneficiaries in 2023

In Arizona, there were 384,200 pregnant women and families with children under 6 years old not yet in kindergarten who could benefit from home visiting. These families included 471,000 children.

The number of families served was included as a proxy for children served.
